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## **CONGRESSIONAL RECORD ON CHOICE 109th CONGRESS, 2nd SESSION**

The year 2006 witnessed two major milestones in the history of the pro-choice movement. First, in February, anti-choice South Dakota legislators imposed the nation's first state ban on abortion care since 1991. The ban would have outlawed abortion care in almost all circumstances – even in cases of rape, incest, or when a woman's health is at risk. Authors of this ban freely admitted their intention to prompt a legal challenge to *Roe v. Wade*, taking special note of the recent anti-choice additions to the Supreme Court: Chief Justice John Roberts and Associate Justice Samuel Alito. Reproductive-rights advocates, including NARAL Pro-Choice America, launched a successful grassroots campaign against the ban, garnering more than 38,000 signatures to put the unconstitutional law before voters on the November ballot. In a resounding victory for the values of freedom and privacy, South Dakotans voted to repeal the extreme ban.

Second, roused by the South Dakota abortion ban and other divisive attacks on privacy and choice at the state and federal levels, pro-choice voters turned out in droves in Novem-

ber's mid-term elections. As a result, pro-choice lawmakers took back control of Congress for the first time since 1994, picking up 23 net pro-choice seats in the House and three net pro-choice seats in the Senate. Although anti-choice lawmakers still retain numerical majorities in both chambers of Congress, these pro-choice pick-ups will prove crucial in stopping President Bush and his relentless anti-choice base from advancing bills to further dismantle reproductive freedom. Moreover, by taking back control of the Senate, pro-choice senators now have a greater say in moderating President Bush's conservative judicial nominees, which will be especially vital should another vacancy open up on the U.S. Supreme Court in the next two years.

The 109th Congress consisted of only 142 solidly pro-choice House members out of 435, with fully pro-choice senators numbering only 32 of 100. The impact of these proportions is amply evident in the legislative record: since anti-choice forces gained control of both the House and Senate in 1995, Congress has voted 185 times on reproductive-rights and family-planning issues. Pro-choice Americans lost all but 41 of these votes.

NARAL Pro-Choice America's *2006 Congressional Record on Choice* documents the key reproductive-rights votes taken during the second session of the 109th Congress. During the course of the year, anti-choice lawmakers took the following actions to restrict women's reproductive freedom:

- **Justice Samuel Alito:** In January, after a failed filibuster attempt, the Senate confirmed President Bush's anti-choice nominee Samuel Alito to the Supreme Court by a vote of 58-42. Alito has said that "the Constitution does not protect a right to an abortion," and, as a lawyer in the Reagan administration, he was an architect of the legal strategy to undermine and eventually attempt to overturn *Roe v. Wade*.
- **Parental-involvement mandates:** Anti-choice lawmakers advanced legislation to make it more difficult and dangerous for young women to access abortion care. First, the Senate passed the Child Custody Protection Act (CCPA) – a bill that makes criminals of caring and trusted adults who accompany young women across state lines for abortion care. Apparently not satisfied with the scope of this legislation, two months later anti-choice House lawmakers passed the Child Interstate Abortion Notification Act (CIANA). In addition to CCPA's provisions, CIANA also imposes parental-notice mandates on many young women – even if their home states have decided not to pass such laws. While we all want teens in trouble to talk with their parents, sometimes this just isn't possible. Fortunately, pro-choice senators blocked repeated attempts to send the bills to conference, as well as a last-ditch effort by anti-choice senators to bypass regular legislative procedure and send CIANA

straight to President Bush on the very last day of the Senate's session.

- **Anti-choice congressional hearing:** Perhaps feeling emboldened by the new composition of the Supreme Court, anti-choice House lawmakers demonstrated interest in renewing frontal attacks on legal abortion and held a hearing on the “scope and myths” of *Roe v. Wade*.
- **Attacks on mifepristone:** Anti-choice lawmakers continued their campaign against the safe and effective early-abortion pill – known as mifepristone, or RU 486. In addition to advancing two bills to restrict access to the medication, anti-choice lawmakers held a hearing to misinform the public about the drug's safety record.
- **Abortion bans:** Finally, an anti-choice-dominated Congress continued bans on abortion access for women who depend on the federal government for their health care: Medicaid and Medicare clients, U.S. servicewomen and military dependents, federal employees, residents of the District of Columbia, and women in federal prison.

Meanwhile, the Bush administration continued to lead its own assault on reproductive freedom:

- **Federal Abortion Ban:** In November, at the request of the Bush Justice Department, the Supreme Court heard arguments on the Federal Abortion Ban, which six lower federal courts have already declared unconstitutional. Signed into law by President

Bush in 2003, the Federal Abortion Ban outlaws safe and medically appropriate abortion care as early as 12 weeks of pregnancy. In 2000, the Supreme Court ruled 5-4 that a similar state law was unconstitutional, with former Justice Sandra Day O'Connor casting the critical fifth pro-choice vote. Many fear that now, given the new faces on the bench, the Court could reverse its 2000 ruling, uphold the federal law, and usher in a new wave of bans on legal abortion.

- **Eric Keroack appointment:** Also in November, just weeks after pledging to work in a bipartisan manner with the newly elected Democratic Congress, President Bush appointed anti-birth-control, “abstinence-only” advocate Eric Keroack to be the chief of our nation’s family-planning program. Formerly associated with an organization that considers birth control “demeaning to women,” Keroack is not fit to serve in this position so important to preserving women’s reproductive health.
- **Anti-choice funding priorities:** The president proposed yet another increase in taxpayer funding for unproven and dangerous “abstinence-only” programs, while giving no increase to the Title X family-planning program (which provides essential health-care services to millions of American women) and drastically cutting international family-planning assistance.

Despite the onslaught of anti-choice activity, pro-choice and pro-family-planning lawmakers continued to put forth a positive, pro-choice agenda – and even secured a key victory to help women prevent unintended pregnancy:

- **Emergency contraception:** After more than three years of delay, the Food and Drug Administration finally succumbed to the overwhelming scientific evidence and approved over-the-counter sales of emergency contraception for adults. While the decision is a big step forward for women’s health, public-health experts agree that the age restriction is unnecessary – and so unfortunately, the decision will do little to stem the teen-pregnancy epidemic in America.
- **Teen-pregnancy prevention:** When the Senate debated legislation to restrict access to abortion care for young women, pro-choice Sens. Frank Lautenberg and Robert Menendez (both D-NJ) offered an amendment to prevent teen pregnancy. Unfortunately, the Senate rejected their commonsense proposal narrowly, 51-48, showing yet again that anti-choice lawmakers who do all they can to make abortion more difficult and dangerous also refuse to take steps that would make it less *necessary*.
- **Freedom of Choice Act:** As anti-choice advocates rallied around South Dakota’s extreme abortion ban, pro-choice lawmakers



ers, led by Sen. Barbara Boxer (D-CA) and Rep. Jerrold Nadler (D-NY), introduced the Freedom of Choice Act, a bill to codify a woman's right to choose in federal law.

- **Medical accuracy:** Pro-choice Reps. Luis Gutierrez (D-IL) and Jim Moran (D-VA) joined Sen. Lautenberg in introducing legislation to ensure that federally funded "abstinence-only" programs – as well as any traditional sex-education programs that may receive federal assistance in the future – must be medically accurate.
- **Crisis pregnancy centers:** Pro-choice Rep. Carolyn Maloney (D-NY) introduced a bill to protect women from anti-choice crisis pregnancy centers that use false advertising to lure women seeking medical care or honest counseling into their fake clinics.

In sum, 2006 brought with it battles for reproductive freedom and privacy in all branches of government, as well as a political resurgence of pro-choice voters in South Dakota and nationwide. Looking forward to a brighter future in the 110th Congress, NARAL Pro-Choice America will continue to defend a woman's right to choose and advocate for commonsense policies that promote reproductive health, prevent unintended pregnancy, and reduce the need for abortion.





## SENATE VOTES

- 1. Alito Nomination.** Motion to invoke cloture (end debate) on the nomination of anti-choice Samuel Alito to the post of Associate Justice of the Supreme Court. Three-fifths of the Senate (60 votes) is required to invoke cloture. Cloture motion passed 72-25; a pro-choice vote (+) was against cloture (1/30/06).
- 2. Alito Confirmation.** Vote to confirm anti-choice nominee Samuel Alito to the post of Associate Justice of the Supreme Court. Confirmed 58-42; a pro-choice vote (+) was against confirmation (1/31/06).
- 3. Teen-Pregnancy Prevention.** Child Custody Protection Act, S.403. Lautenberg and Menendez (both D-NJ) amendment to fund teen-pregnancy-prevention programs and ensure that federally funded “abstinence-only” curricula are medically accurate. Rejected 48-51; a pro-choice vote (+) was in support of the amendment (7/25/06).

4. **Child Custody Protection Act, S.403.** Final passage of Ensign (R-NV) bill to make it a federal crime for anyone other than a parent – including a grandparent, adult sibling, or religious counselor – to accompany a young woman across state lines for abortion care if the home state parental-involvement mandate has not been met. Passed 65-34; a pro-choice vote (+) was against the bill (7/25/06).
  
5. **Child Interstate Abortion Notification Act, S.403.** Motion to invoke cloture (end debate) on House-passed version of S.403, the Child Interstate Abortion Notification Act. In addition to the provisions of the Child Custody Protection Act, this bill imposes a new, impossibly complex, national patchwork of parental-notice mandates on doctors and young women – even in states that have decided not to pass such laws. Three-fifths of the Senate (60 votes) is required to invoke cloture. Cloture motion rejected 57-42; a pro-choice vote (+) was against cloture (9/29/06).

- 1. Women in the Military.** FY'07 National Defense Authorization Act, H.R.5122. Davis (D-CA) amendment to repeal current law prohibiting military personnel and their dependents from obtaining privately funded abortion services at overseas military hospitals. Rejected 191-237; a pro-choice vote (+) was in support of the amendment (5/10/06).
- 2. Child Interstate Abortion Notification Act, S.403.** Final passage. Vote on bill to impose a new, impossibly complex, national patchwork of parental-notice mandates on doctors and young women – even in states that have decided not to pass such laws. The bill also makes it a federal crime for anyone other than a parent – including a grandparent, adult sibling, or religious counselor – to accompany a young woman across state lines for abortion care if her home state parental-involvement mandate has not been met. (Note: prior to this vote, through a manager's amendment, Rep. Sensenbrenner (R-WI) removed the bill's

original text and replaced it with a slightly modified version of the Ros-Lehtinen (R-FL) bill, H.R.748.) Passed 264-153; a pro-choice vote (+) was against final passage (9/26/06).
